Instructions

1. Note how long you count birds at any one time (e.g. 10 minutes, 30 minutes, an hour). Record how long you observe the birds in the comments section.
2. Count all the different species and numbers of birds of each species you see at your feeders or in your yard during the observation period.
3. If observing several times during the day, only report the highest number of any one species. This is to try to ensure you don't count the same bird more than once. Keep track of the length of total observation.
4. Add bird species and numbers as you observe them. Use additional pages as needed.
5. Record observations of all species you see. Wild mammals are ok too.
